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

What is FERPA (Family Educational Rights & Privacy Act) and what do I need to know?

- Sets forth requirements regarding the privacy of student educational records
- FERPA rights transfer from the parent to student at the age of 18 or when attending a postsecondary institution
- MyPurdue Proxy student can give parents access to view certain pieces of information



How will my student receive communication and information from Purdue and/or the College of Engineering?

- Purdue & CoE routinely communicates with students via email
- Students need to get into the habit of checking their Purdue email routinely & managing email
- Just in time emails will be sent to first-generation students from CoE - important dates or events
- Academic advisors may communicate via texts from BoilerConnect
- Social media (Twitter & Instagram)



My student is struggling with their class schedule or a specific class.

- Advise your student to contact their academic advisor.
  - This is likely the person who helped them request classes during VSTAR.
  - Your student can make an appointment or message their academic advisor from Boiler Connect.
- Faculty/Instructor/Teaching Assistant (TA) Office Hours



#### My student is struggling academically with course work.

College of Engineering has 2 programs that offer tutoring.

- WIEP (Women in Engineering Program)
- MEP (Minority in Engineering Program)

Purdue offers tutoring and academic assistance through several programs

- <u>Academic Success Center (ASC)</u>
- Supplemental Instruction (SI)
- Writing Lab
- Disability Resources Center (DRC)
- Resource/Help Rooms Math, Physics, Chemistry
- <u>Tutoring</u>





#### My student is sick or showing worrisome signs of stress.

- Illness, injury, or other physical malady.
  - Purdue Student Health Center (PUSH)
    - PUSH is not a Medicaid Provider but does accept most insurance.
- Worrisome signs of mental stress from either classwork, living adjustments, or social situations.
  - Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS)
    - Counseling and therapy
    - Psychiatric Services
    - Alcohol and Drug Abuse Programs
    - Outreach and Prevention Workshops
    - Group Therapy can attend an unlimited number of group sessions at no charge
    - Care Management
    - Self-help resources



#### My student needs monetary help.

- Dean of Students, <u>Office of Student Support Services</u>
  - Emergency Loans
    - 30-day interest-free loans of up to \$1,000.
- Financial Aid for School
  - Remember to complete and file a FAFSA each year
- Financial Hardship Lori Pence
- Affordability Scholarships (college & schools) Lori Pence



How can my student stay safe at Purdue?

- Survey the campus while classes are in session and after dark to see that academic buildings, walkways, facilities, and parking lots are adequately secured and well-lighted
- Be aware of surroundings
- Don't walk alone at night
- Safe Walk Program PUPD
- Emergency Telephone Call Boxes –Blue light
- Laptop and bicycle registration PUPD



Navigating transitions for students and families

- Student transition living away from home, becoming familiar with a new setting or new geographic location, sharing a room, meeting new people, and cultivating friendships
- Time management, how to study, ask for help, everything in moderation, run your race
- Families will have their own transition
- Everyone needs to be aware of and respect the transition of the other



How often should I talk/text with my student?

- Have a conversation about the mode of communication before you drop them off
- How often set up an agreeable communication plan so everyone is on the same page and aware of the expectations
- What do you need? Listen, vent, opinion, or help fix the problem



What should my student bring to campus

- Review move-in details Purdue Residences webpage – especially what <u>NOT</u> to bring
- Discuss large items, electronics, and appliances with roommate(s) – who is bringing what?
- Shower caddy & shower shoes
- Bring things from home or bedroom that provide a sense of familiarity and also items to personalize or decorate your space – have fun with it!
- Care packages comprised of favorite snacks or comfort foods are great, especially during stressful weeks or final exam week
