A Champion in and out of the Ring

Kyle Albertson hasn't let disability stop him from excelling

Nineteen-year-old Kyle Albertson is a 10-year 4-H member from Benton County, Indiana. Like many other 4-Hers, he loves to show sheep – Southdown sheep in his case. However, unlike most, Kyle must use some special technologies in the ring, and other areas of life, due to the challenges he faces because of muscular dystrophy.

Kyle was introduced to showing sheep by some family friends when he was a third-grader. At that time, his father improvised

an attachment for his wheelchair, based on trimming stands used for grooming sheep, which allowed Kyle to guide his animals in the ring. About three years ago, the apparatus was modified by another family friend, John Kretzmeir, to make it more effective and comfortable for the sheep. Kyle now shows the Kretzmeirs' sheep at fairs.

All the efforts have paid off, as Kyle has won Senior Sheep Showmanship and Grand Champion Sheep Showmanship awards at the Benton County 4-H Fair.

Kyle's friends and family have also made a variety of adaptations around the farm to increase his participation in activities like planting and harvesting. In addition, he has a modified van that enables him to drive and thus be more independent.

Kyle was also among the honored few to be named a torchbearer for Benton County during the 2016 Indiana Bicentennial Torch

Relay on its 3,200-mile journey across the state.

The future continues to look bright for Kyle as he recently graduated from Benton Central High School where he was active in FFA and assisted with the group's large annual consignment auction. Kyle is slated to attend Purdue University in the fall to pursue a degree in agribusiness.

Proposed Federal Budget Cuts

AgrAbility funding in question for 2018 USDA budget



AgrAbility has been included in the president's budget for the past five years.

Prior to that, the program was included in the final federal budget through the actions of senators and/or representatives.

For the past five fiscal years, AgrAbility funding was included as part of President Obama's budget. Prior to that time, or for approximately 20 years, authorization for the program existed through the Farm Bill, but no funds were allocated to it in any president's proposed budget. During that time, funding for AgrAbility was included in the final federal budget through the actions of one or more senators or representatives.

In the initial USDA/NIFA 2018 Budget, the entire AgrAbility/farm safety amount was eliminated. Reasons included the Administration's efforts to "redirect available resources, as appropriate, from lower-priority areas to other science and technology activities."

However, in their "markup" sessions, the House and Senate Appropriations Committees recommended that AgrAbility/farm safety be funded at its current level. This does not guarantee that AgrAbility funding will be included in the final federal budget for FY18, however, as there are several more steps on the budget process.

Embassy Men: Bridging Horizons Community Service Contest winners

"Embassy Men," the men's ministry group at Linton First Christian Church, won first place in the 2017 Bridging Horizons Community Service Contest. They built a wheelchair-access ramp onto a house trailer to enable the resident to safely enter and exit. The individual previously had to rely on others to bring him food and supplies, and had missed several medical appointments because he couldn't leave the trailer.

Second place went to Forest Park FFA of Ferdinand, IN, which built an accessible cart that enabled an elementary school student with a disability to deliver library books in his school. Springs Valley Jr./Sr. High School's construction technology program, Fellowship of Christian Athletes group, and FFA partnered to win third place by completing several projects during the year, including wheelchair-access ramps.

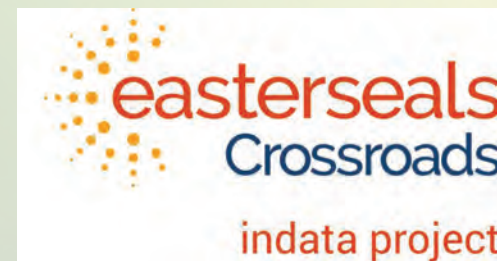
The award, the first of its kind, was presented during a celebration of INDATA's 10th anniversary.

Loans for assistive technology available through INDATA

INDATA, Indiana's Assistive Technology Act project, provides a variety of services that allow consumers to access assistive technology to address disability needs. Among those services, its Alternative Financing Program (AFP) provides low-interest, extended rate loans to qualified individuals needing a variety of technologies.

The AFP is a partnership between Easterseals Crossroads and STAR Financial, and is available throughout Indiana. Individuals must meet eligibility requirements, provide disability documentation, and complete the application process.

TOOLBOX Spotlight

TOOLS TO MAKE LIFE EASIER



The Quick-Cut Greens Harvester

is powered by a cordless drill and designed to harvest over 150 pounds of salad greens an hour without having to kneel or use a knife or scissors. The device consists of (1) an upright metal frame with a crossbar and a hand grip at the top and a serrated blade at the bottom; (2) a rotating macramé brush that gently pulls the leaves into the oscillating blade, which cuts them off at ground level; and (3) a cloth basket to catch the harvested crop. The universal mount on the frame is designed to accept almost any kind of cordless drill, although 18-volt models reportedly work best.
