In March of 2005, Keith
Morgan of Brookston, Indiana,
fell off of a ladder while installing
foam insulation in his tool shed.
He broke both ankles and his left
leg, and as a result, Keith had
to use a wheelchair for several
months following the accident.

Another consequence of the fall was that he was not able to plant his crops that spring. While he was fortunate to have family and neighbors who got the crops in for him that spring, he was determined to be the one in the combine in the fall. Keith's neighbor, a former Breaking New Ground client, suggested that he contact BNG to do an assessment.

Steve Swain of BNG went to Keith's farm and assessed what changes could be made. Keith explained that he was not able

to climb the ladder on the combine or on the grain bin because his ankles could no longer bend adequately. After Steve made his assessment, Keith started alterations on the equipment. He was able to have a platform lift installed on his combine to allow him to harvest in the fall. In addition, Keith added stairs on his grain bin to allow him to more easily climb to the top, and he mounted additional steps to his tractors to make it easier for him to climb into the cabs.

Keith said that, "Breaking New Ground took into account what I could and couldn't do and made alterations to allow me to keep doing what I love."

Bridging Horizons Contest

For ten years, Breaking New Ground has sponsored the Bridging Horizons Contest for Indiana FFA Chapters. Bridging Horizons provides a community-oriented service experience that gives groups the opportunity to apply the knowledge they have gained and make a positive impact by helping community members overcome physical barriers.

Each entrant completes a low cost project in their community that helps to enhance independence for a person with a disability. The first, second, and third place winners receive cash prizes of \$500, \$250, and \$100 respectively. Last year's winner was the Jay County FFA, which constructed a ramp and handrail for a voting location that was not accessible.


To expand the impact of the Bridging Horizons Contest, BNG has decided to open the contest to any youth or adult service organization in Indiana. Some examples of these organizations include 4-H clubs, FFA chapters, Jr. Leaders, Boy Scouts, Young Farmers, Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions Club, and volunteer fire departments.

Possible projects include building wheelchair access ramps, modifying a piece of farm equipment to accommodate a disability, or improving the

accessibility of county fairgrounds.

Keep in mind that disability encompasses more than just wheelchair users. We assist many farmers with arthritis, back pain, vision impairments, as well as those suffering from spinal cord injuries and other severe disabilities. This might help you consider a more diverse range of projects in your community.

REACHING OUT TO MIGRANT FARMWORKERS

Recently the National AgrAbility Project, California AgrAbility, Breaking New Ground, the Arthritis Foundation-Indiana Chapter, and Transition Resources Corporation, teamed up to produce a fotonovela about arthritis and agriculture titled ¿Podrá ser la Artritis lo que me causa Dolor? (Could

Arthritis be the Cause of my Pain?). A fotonovela is similar to a comic book in that it uses photos coupled with character dialogue in captions. This resource aims to reach out to migrant and seasonal farmworkers, and is also a good resource for any Latino population.

The fotonovela tells the story of Rosa, Sara, and Angelo who have arthritis from years of working in vineyards, vegetable farms, and



a local dairy. The story describes how their pain affects them both at work and at home. The father, Angelo, is ultimately persuaded to visit a healthcare provider for diagnosis and treatment. The resource contains many facts about arthritis through the story, and key points and resources are listed at the end. This publication is

a great resource to help AgrAbility reach out to the migrant/seasonal farmworker population and the general rural public also.

The Hydraulic **Quick Coupling** Kit replaces the old style of hydraulic coupling. Rather than having to use two hands to hook up hydraulic hoses, it allows vou to open a valve to relieve the back pressure so the hose can be pushed in or pulled out of the receiver with one hand.
