Question 1: [25%, Work-out question, Outcome 1]

- [10%] X is a binomial random variable with $n = 3$ and $p = 1/3$. Find the conditional expectation $E(X|X \geq 1)$.
- [15%] X is an exponential random variable with $\lambda = 1$. Find the probability $P(\sin(X \cdot \pi) > 0)$. Hint: when $X = 22.5$, $\sin(X \cdot \pi) = 1$, and when $X = 9.5$, $\sin(X \cdot \pi) = -1$.

$$1. P(X=k|X \geq 1) = \frac{P(X=k|X \geq 1)}{P(X \geq 1)} = \begin{cases} \frac{P(X=k)}{P(X \geq 1)} & k \geq 1 \\ 0 & \text{otherwise} \end{cases}$$

$$E[X|X \geq 1] = \sum_{k=1}^{\infty} k P(X=k|X \geq 1) = \frac{1}{P(X \geq 1)} \sum_{k=1}^3 k \binom{3}{k} p^k (1-p)^{3-k}$$

$$P(X \geq 1) = 1 - P(X=0) = 1 - \binom{3}{0} p^0 (1-p)^3 = 1 - (1) \left(\frac{2}{3}\right)^3 = 1 - \frac{8}{27} = \frac{19}{27}$$

$$\rightarrow = \frac{27}{19} \left[\sum_{k=1}^3 k \binom{3}{k} p^k (1-p)^{3-k} \right] = \frac{27}{19} E[X] = \frac{27}{19} (3) \left(\frac{1}{3}\right) = \frac{27}{19}$$

$$2. P(\sin(\pi X) > 0) = P(0 < X < 1) + P(2 < X < 3) + P(4 < X < 5) + \dots$$

$$= \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} P(2k < X < 2k+1)$$

$$= \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} \int_{2k}^{2k+1} \lambda e^{-\lambda x} dx = \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} \left[-e^{-\lambda x} \right]_{2k}^{2k+1} = \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} \left[-e^{-(2k+1)} + e^{-2k} \right]$$

$$= \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} e^{-2k} \left(1 - \frac{1}{e}\right) = \frac{e-1}{e} \frac{1}{1-e^{-2}} = \frac{e-1}{e^2-1} = \frac{e}{e+1}$$

Question 2: [10%, Work-out question, Outcome 1] X is a Bernoulli random variable with $p = \frac{1}{\sqrt{1.7}}$. Construct a new random variable $Y = X^{1.7} \ln(1+X)$. Find the variance $\text{Var}(Y)$.

$$X=0 \Rightarrow Y = (0) \ln(1) = 0$$

$$X=1 \Rightarrow Y = (1)^{1.7} \ln(1+1) = \ln(2)$$

$$P(Y=0) = 1-p \quad P(Y=\ln(2)) = p$$

$$E[Y] = (1-p)(0) + p(\ln 2) = \frac{\ln 2}{\sqrt{1.7}}$$

$$E[Y^2] = (1-p)(0)^2 + p(\ln 2)^2 = \frac{(\ln 2)^2}{\sqrt{1.7}}$$

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Var}(Y) &= E[Y^2] - (E[Y])^2 = \frac{(\ln 2)^2}{\sqrt{1.7}} - \frac{(\ln 2)^2}{1.7} \\ &= \frac{(\ln 2)^2 (\sqrt{1.7} - 1)}{1.7} \end{aligned}$$

Question 3: [30%, Work-out question, Outcome 1] Consider a continuous random variable X with probability density function (pdf) being

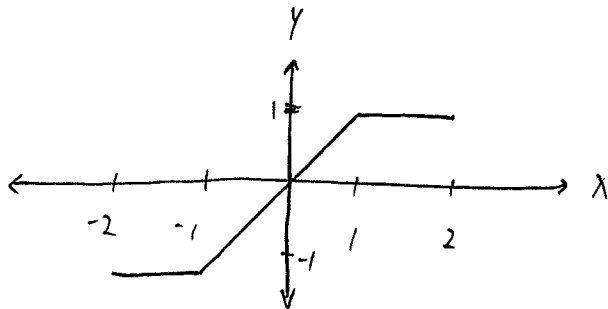
$$f_X(x) = \begin{cases} \frac{x+2}{4} & \text{if } -2 \leq x < 0 \\ \frac{2-x}{4} & \text{if } 0 \leq x < 2 \\ 0 & \text{otherwise} \end{cases} \quad (1)$$

Consider a new random variable $Y = \min(1, \max(-1, X))$.

- [5%] Plot Y versus X for the range of $X = -2$ to 2 . (Hint: What are the values of Y when $X = -2$? Repeat this question for $X = -1, 0, 1, 2$, respectively.)
- [15%] Find the cumulative distribution function (cdf) of Y .
- [10%] Find the pdf of Y . If you do not know the answer to the previous question, you can assume the cdf is

$$F_Y(y) = \begin{cases} 0 & \text{if } x < 0 \\ \frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{2}e^{-x} & \text{if } 0 \leq x < 2 \\ 1 - \frac{1}{2}e^{-x} & \text{if } 2 \leq x. \end{cases} \quad (2)$$

$$2. \quad P(Y = -1) = P(X \leq -1) = \int_{-2}^{-1} \frac{x+2}{4} dx = \frac{1}{4} \left[\frac{1}{2}x^2 + 2x \right]_{-2}^{-1} = \frac{1}{4} \left[\left(\frac{1}{2}(-1)^2 - 2 \right) - \left(\frac{1}{2}(-4) - 4 \right) \right] \\ = \frac{1}{4} \left[-\frac{3}{2} + 2 \right] = \frac{1}{4} \left(\frac{1}{2} \right) = \frac{1}{8}$$

$$P(Y = 1) = P(X \geq 1) = \int_1^2 \frac{2-x}{4} dx = \frac{1}{4} \left[2x - \frac{1}{2}x^2 \right]_1^2 = \frac{1}{8} \quad \text{by symmetry}$$

For $-2 \leq x < 0$

$$F_X(x) = \int_{-2}^x \frac{s+2}{4} ds = \frac{1}{4} \left[\frac{1}{2}s^2 + 2s \right]_{-2}^x = \frac{1}{4} \left[\left(\frac{1}{2}x^2 + 2x \right) - \left(\frac{1}{2}(-4) - 4 \right) \right] = \frac{1}{8}x^2 + \frac{1}{2}x + \frac{1}{2}$$

For $0 \leq x < 2$

$$F_X(x) = \frac{1}{2} + \int_0^x \frac{2-s}{4} ds = \frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{4} \left[2s - \frac{1}{2}s^2 \right]_0^x = \frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{4} \left[\left(2x - \frac{1}{2}x^2 \right) - (0 - 0) \right] \\ = \frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{2}x - \frac{1}{8}x^2$$

$$F_X(x) = \begin{cases} 0 & x < -2 \\ \frac{1}{8}x^2 + \frac{1}{2}x + \frac{1}{2} & -2 \leq x < 0 \\ \frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{2}x - \frac{1}{8}x^2 & 0 \leq x \leq 2 \\ 1 & x > 2 \end{cases}$$

$$F_Y(y) = \begin{cases} 0 & y < -1 \\ \frac{1}{8}y^2 + \frac{1}{2}y + \frac{1}{2} & -1 \leq y < 0 \\ \frac{1}{2}y - \frac{1}{8}y^2 + \frac{1}{2} & 0 \leq y < 1 \\ 1 & y \geq 1 \end{cases}$$

$$3. f_Y(y) = \frac{d}{dy} F_Y(y) = \frac{1}{8} \delta(y+1) + \left(\frac{1}{4}y + \frac{1}{2}\right) (\mathcal{U}(y+1) - \mathcal{U}(y)) + \left(\frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{4}y\right) (\mathcal{U}(y) - \mathcal{U}(y-1)) + \frac{1}{8} \delta(y-1)$$

Alternate Solution:

$$f_Y(y) = \frac{d}{dy} F_Y(y) = \frac{1}{2} e^{-y} (\mathcal{U}(y) - \mathcal{U}(y-2)) + \frac{1}{2} \delta(y-2) + \frac{1}{2} e^{-y} \mathcal{U}(y-2)$$

$$\left. \begin{aligned} P(Y=2) &= (1 - \frac{1}{2}e^{-2}) - (\frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{2}e^{-2}) = \frac{1}{2} \end{aligned} \right\}$$

$$\rightarrow = \frac{1}{2} e^{-y} \mathcal{U}(y) + \frac{1}{2} \delta(y-2)$$

Question 4: [10%, Work-out question, Outcome 1] In average, there are 1.5 new customers per second who arrive in an Apple store to purchase the new iPads. (Each customer is limited to one purchase.) Suppose the actual number of customers is a Poisson random variable.

An Apple store has 500 iPads in stock. What is the probability that the iPads are sold out in 5 minutes? Note: Your solution will be in terms of summation (or integration). There is no need to expand/compute the summation (or the integration).

$$\lambda = \left(\frac{1.5 \text{ customers}}{\text{second}} \right) \left(\frac{60 \text{ seconds}}{\text{minute}} \right) (5 \text{ minutes}) = (90)(5) = 450$$

$$X \sim \text{Poisson}(450)$$

$$\begin{aligned} P(X \geq 500) &= 1 - P(X \leq 499) \\ &= 1 - \sum_{k=0}^{499} \frac{(450)^k}{k!} e^{-450} = \sum_{k=500}^{\infty} \frac{(450)^k}{k!} e^{-450} \end{aligned}$$

Question 5: [25%, Work-out question, Outcome 1] Consider a discrete random variable X with the following probability mass function:

$$p_k = \begin{cases} \frac{1}{6} \left(\frac{2}{3}\right)^{k-4} & \text{if } k \geq 4 \\ \frac{1}{2} & \text{if } k = 1 \\ 0 & \text{otherwise} \end{cases} \quad (3)$$

- [15%] Find the characteristic function $\Phi_X(\omega)$ of the above X .
- [10%] Use the moment theorem to find $E(X)$.

If you do not know the answer to the previous question, you can assume $\Phi_X(\omega) = \frac{2e^{j4\omega}}{3} + \frac{1}{3-j\omega}$ and solve $E(X)$ by the moment theorem.

If you use other method to find $E(X)$, you will receive only 7 points.

$$\begin{aligned} 1. \quad \Phi_X(\omega) &= \sum_{k=-\infty}^{\infty} e^{j\omega k} p_k = \frac{1}{2} e^{j\omega} + \sum_{k=4}^{\infty} \frac{1}{6} \left(\frac{2}{3}\right)^{k-4} e^{j\omega k} \quad \text{Let } n=k-4, \quad k=n+4 \\ &= \frac{1}{2} e^{j\omega} + \frac{1}{6} \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \left(\frac{2}{3}\right)^n e^{j\omega(n+4)} \\ &= \frac{1}{2} e^{j\omega} + \frac{1}{6} e^{j4\omega} \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \left(\frac{2}{3} e^{j\omega}\right)^n = \frac{1}{2} e^{j\omega} + \frac{1}{6} e^{j4\omega} \frac{1}{1-\frac{2}{3} e^{j\omega}} \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} 2. \quad E[X] &= \frac{1}{j} \frac{d}{d\omega} \Phi_X(\omega) \Big|_{\omega=0} = \frac{1}{j} \left[\frac{1}{2} j e^{j\omega} + \frac{1}{1-\frac{2}{3} e^{j\omega}} \left(\frac{4j}{6} e^{j4\omega} \right) + \frac{1}{6} e^{j4\omega} \frac{-1}{(1-\frac{2}{3} e^{j\omega})^2} \left(-\frac{2j}{3} \right) \right] \Big|_{\omega=0} \\ &= \frac{1}{j} \left[\frac{j}{2} + \frac{2j}{3} + \frac{1}{6} \left(\frac{2j}{3}\right) \frac{1}{\frac{1}{3}} \right] = \left[\frac{1}{2} + 2 + 1 \right] = \frac{3+2+3}{2} = \frac{8}{2} = 4 \end{aligned}$$

Alternate Solution:

$$\begin{aligned} E[X] &= \frac{1}{j} \frac{d}{d\omega} \left[\frac{2}{3} e^{j4\omega} + \frac{1}{3-j\omega} \right] \Big|_{\omega=0} = \frac{1}{j} \left[\frac{2}{3} (j4) e^{j4\omega} + \frac{-1}{(3-j\omega)^2} (-j) \right] \Big|_{\omega=0} \\ &= \frac{8}{3} + \frac{1}{9} = \frac{24+1}{9} = \frac{25}{9} \end{aligned}$$
